

The following data and information is provided to the Historic Core BID for tracking purposes. The information contained in this report is for activities reported in May 2022. The data and information is obtained from Ambassadors conducting patrols and entered in Statview.

SIGNIFICANT INCIDENTS

May 1st - At around 0406 hours, BID officer Harbour and Novales were on their routine patrol when they received a service call pertaining to a possible dumpster fire at Frank Court. BID officers quickly made their way to the location and found the dumpster caught up in flames. While BID officer Harbour placed a call to LAFD, BID officer Novales attempted to minimize the fire by using a fire extinguisher. The fire extinguisher was able to stall them some time until LAFD arrived. LAFD ended up using their fire hose to extinguish the flame. Once LAFD departed, BID officers checked for any possible structure damage to the outside of the building. As everything appeared to be in order, BID officers advised the building security of the situation and resumed their patrol.

May 3rd - During the early evening hours, at approximately 1907 hours, BID officers observed a demonstrating circling in and out of the district on Broadway in route towards pershing square. BID officers maintained uniform presence and remained vigilant for any possible signs of vandalism or property damage. Within the hour, BID officers learned that the demonstration escalated into a clash with police officers over at pershing square. BID officers continued to remain on the district's western border in an effort to deter unwanted activity. As more LAPD units arrived on scene, they were able to disperse the large crowds and make a few arrests. Once the situation was under control, BID officers departed from the scene and remained on high alert.

May 11th - At approximately 0500 hours, BID officer Novales was on his routine patrol when he received a service call from 6th and Spring. The caller stated that two transients, who had just left, set a few pieces of cardboard and clothes on fire. Novales was able to arrive on scene within a few minutes and extinguish the flames. Although the fire caused minimal damage to the roll up gate at the business, there was no indication of structural damage.

May 15th - BID officer Garcia was patrolling the 5th street corridor when he came across an unresponsive individual at 5th and Main Street. Upon making contact, the subject was not responding to any verbal commands. BID officer Garcia dispatched LAFD for further assistance. After talking to a few witnesses, they informed BID officers that the individual fell over and hit their head on the curb. BID officer

Garcia informed LAFD dispatch as well. Upon arrival, LAPD was able to make contact with the individual. Although they were able to regain consciousness, the subject still appeared to be disoriented. LAFD paramedics went ahead and transported the sub to the nearest hospital in stable condition.

May 18th - BID officers received a service call at 6th and Los Angeles regarding an individual jumping on a car. Upon arrival, BID officers were able to locate the subject in question. However, after several verbal attempts the subject was uncooperative. LAPD was dispatched by BID officers for further assistance. As LAPD arrived on scene, they took over the situation. After multiple attempts, LAPD was able to get the subject off the vehicle and back onto the sidewalk. LAPD then took the subject in on a 5150 hold due to his current state.

May 22nd - During the early AM hours, at 0133 hours, BID officers received a service call at 7th and Spring pertaining to an aggressive transient causing a disturbance. As BID officers arrived at the location, they were able to locate the transient. The transient became hostile with BID officers at well and attempted to spit at them. LAPD was dispatched to the location for assistance. Before LAPD arrived to the location, the transient ended up wandering across the street towards the fashion district side. BID officers made contact with the responding LAPD unit and advised them of the transient's whereabouts. LAPD said they would remain close to the area and call if additional information was needed. The transient never came back throughout the night or the following days.

Accomplishments


May, 2022 - As the Historic Core businesses continued to get burglarized in early May, LAPD had a breakthrough with the apprehension of a possible suspect. Since the apprehension, there has been no burglaries involving manhole covers or other similar break ins. BID officers maintained a proactive approach during these burglaries by securing the broken windows/doors, following up with the merchants, and retrieving camera footage when available. In partnership with the community, the Historic Core was able to provide crucial leads to LAPD which resulted in a positive outcome.




Our outreach coordinator is seen here distributing meals from LAHSA.



BID officers also provide those in need with resources.




Cedric is seen here providing assistance to someone in need.




BID officer Novales is seen here extinguishing a fire outside of the park.




